A very important upcoming event that I would like to direct your attention to is Student-Led Conferences. They will occur on Wednesday and Thursday, October 18 and 19 respectively. Conference times are:

Wednesday, October 18, 4:00 – 8:00 p.m. Thursday, October 19, 7:30 – 11:00 a.m. Thursday, October 19, 12:00 - 3:00 p.m. Thursday, October 19, 4:00 – 8:00 p.m.

One of the most important things that you can do as a parent to help your child achieve is to not only establish regular and open communication with their teachers, but also become informed about what courses and programs your student most enjoys and the ways in which high school experiences and opportunities can and will relate to post-secondary success. Our Student-Led Conferences afford students and parents the opportunity for this very thing-alongside their Advisory Teacher. Unique only to Student-Led Conferences: Freshmen will share information about the personal strengths finder survey they've taken and set goals for their time in high school. Sophomores will reflect upon surveys they've taken and discuss how these align to goals. They will have completed numerous assessments in Naviance: Strengths Explorer, Learning & Productivity, Intelligences, Career Cluster Finder, Personalities, Skills and Career Key. The Naviance assessments provide a wealth of information about individual students, their personalities and interests, matching career paths to individual student dispositions. Juniors will engage in conversation about future plans and goals they've set for their future. Students will discuss goals they have for this pivotal high school year. Seniors will reflect upon next steps to actualize their goals.

We will be using the scheduling platform myconferencetime.com for student-led and regular class conferences. Students will sign up during their advisory class for their student-led conference. Once those conferences are in place, you will have the opportunity to schedule with as many of your student's other teachers as you need to. 15-minute appointments will be available and you'll have the opportunity to choose virtual or in-person meetings. Our Counseling and Administrative Staff will also be listed on myconferencetime.com and available during conferences. Please do not hesitate to schedule with one of us.

As we approach the end of the first 9-weeks, we are aware that some students may be struggling. Tuesday/Thursday Interventions recently began and are a great opportunity for students who need more time on campus to work. If your child is referred by our staff, we certainly hope you will support our efforts to ensure their success by encouraging attendance. It is our mission to ensure that every student learns to the best of their ability.

Apply Kansas

The first step in going to college is to apply! For many students, applying to college can be a daunting task, but it can be particularly overwhelming for students who may be the first in their families to pursue postsecondary educational dreams or have yet to consider their plans after high school. WRHS is joining the <u>Apply Kansas</u> month-long, state-wide initiative to increase the number of students applying, enrolling, and succeeding in college or other postsecondary goals.

PSAT/National Merit Scholarship Competition (NMSC)

The PSAT will be offered on October 18 and 19 at 8am at WRHS. 400 students are registered; students should check their email for PSAT updates. The night before the exam, they should get rest and in the morning, eat breakfast in order to do their best. Practice materials can be found on the <u>PSAT website</u>.

Free ACT for Juniors on February 27

The State of Kansas offers a free ACT to juniors on February 27. Juniors must register by October 31 to take the test. Registration must be completed from a USD 437 student email. The form is <u>HERE</u>.

National Merit Semifinalist

Washburn Rural High School is excited to announce six Semifinalists out of the 16,000 Semifinalists in the 69th annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Samuel Byrne, Audrey Caleb, Blaine McVey, Allison Reed, Pierce Romine, and Anshumann Zutshiare this year's Semifinalist. These academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,140 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$28 million that will be offered next spring. To be considered for a Merit Scholarship[®] award, Semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the Finalist level of the competition.

Over 95 percent of the Semifinalists are expected to attain Finalist standing, and more than half of the Finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar® title. NMSC, a not-for-profit organization that operates without government assistance, was established in 1955 specifically to conduct the annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Scholarships are underwritten by NMSC with its own funds and by approximately 320 business organizations and higher education institutions that share NMSC's goals of honoring the nation's scholastic champions and encouraging the pursuit of academic excellence.

National Merit Semifinalist

Over 1.3 million juniors in about 21,000 high schools entered the 2024 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2022 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT[®]), which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state. The number of Semifinalists in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors. WRHS also had 3 National Merit Commended Scholars which represent the top 5 percent in the nation. Congratulations to Lance Allen, Zachary Billups, and Caylen McCoy

To become a Finalist, the Semifinalist and a high school official must submit a detailed scholarship application, in which they provide information about the Semifinalist's academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment, and honors and awards received. A Semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, and write an essay.

From the approximately 16,000 Semifinalists, about 15,000 are expected to advance to the Finalist level, and in February they will be notified of this designation. All National Merit Scholarship winners will be selected from this group of Finalists. Merit Scholar designees are selected on the basis of their skills, accomplishments, and potential for success in rigorous college studies, without regard to gender, race, ethnic origin, or religious preference.



Three types of National Merit Scholarships will be offered in the spring of 2024. Every Finalist will compete for one of 2,500 National Merit[®] \$2500 Scholarships that will be awarded on a state-representational basis. About 840 corporate-sponsored Merit Scholarship awards will be provided by approximately 160 corporations and business organizations for Finalists who meet their specified criteria, such as children of the grantor's employees or residents of communities where sponsor plants or offices are located. In addition, about 160 colleges and universities are expected to finance some 3,800 college-sponsored Merit Scholarship awards for Finalists who will attend the sponsor institution.

National Merit Scholarship winners of 2024 will be announced in four nationwide news releases beginning in April and concluding in July. These scholarship recipients will join more than 375,000 other distinguished young people who have earned the Merit Scholar title.

2023-24 UNSUNG HERO PORTRAITS

Students enrolled in this year's A.P. Studio Art class started the school year by collaborating on two massive 7' x 9' portraits in the style of contemporary artist Chuck Close.

Students began the project by selecting their subjects from any person in our local school community, based on who they wanted to honor as an Unsung Hero. After contacting their Hero, each group shot photos to work from, laid out a grid to enlarge the photos for proper proportions, and began work on their portrait. The project promoted communication within the groups and required them to work collectively, striving to create a work with unity that captured the likeness of their Hero.

Artist Chuck Close (1940-2021) was the projects' inspiration. Close reinvented the "portrait" in the late 1960's by working on a large-scale format. He became an overnight sensation in the art world when he created a series of seven portraits, beginning with himself, that were done with one tube of black mars acrylic paint, applied with an airbrush. His original portraits were done on canvas in this exact size using a grid to assist in a photo-realistic image transfer from his photograph to canvas. Chuck Close recently passed away on August 19, 2021.

Everyone needs someone like Exum in their life, someone to look up to, someone who cheers you on through everything, and someone who is so passionate that you can't do anything but join in. It's hard to put into words how deserving Exum is of this project, but, just like how Exum does his best to acknowledge and honor everyone in his class, we hope this portrait honors him and expresses our respect and appreciation for him.

Students in Mr. Goehring's Sports Med II class learned from Athletic Trainer Brad Perry about Wet Bulb Globe Temperature (WBGT). It is calculated to measure heat stress in direct sunlight. This index helps guide decisions related to the amount of strenuous outdoor activity that athletes can safely perform in given conditions. This was extremely relevant to the first week of school with fall sports practices and the outdoor temperature and humidity.

After watching a documentary on Bill Gates, Brian McFall's IB/Honors Business Management students invited a local Bridge group to the school to teach the students how to play Bridge. Some of these ladies have been playing Bridge for over 60 years! "Bill Gates and Warren Buffett say that playing Bridge is key to their success. Bill Gates and Warren Buffett are among the world's wealthiest people. When we played bridge I realized the fun and attraction the game has. Work-based learning prepares high school students by equipping them with the necessary skills, knowledge, and confidence to succeed in the workforce after graduation.

Certificates and Industry Recognized Credentials

<u>YouScience</u> is a valuable tool for classrooms that helps students explore their interests, skills, and potential career paths. It provides personalized assessments and career recommendations based on a student's aptitudes and interests. With YouScience, students can make more informed decisions about their future education and career choices, leading to greater engagement and success in the classroom. Most CTE teachers will be offering YouScience exams in their classrooms beginning spring 2024.

<u>NCCER</u>, or the National Center for Construction Education and Research, offers industry-recognized credentials for high school students in construction-related fields. By participating in NCCER programs, high school students can gain valuable skills and knowledge that prepare them for careers in construction and related industries. NCCER certifications provide

students with a competitive edge in the job market and open doors to a wide range of opportunities in the construction industry. Students are eligible to participate this semester.

Ms. Dible is offering the <u>ServSafe</u> Food Handler and Manager exams in the culinary courses. These exams verify that a manager or person-in-charge has sufficient food safety knowledge to protect the public from food borne illness, ensures proper personal hygiene, prevents cross-contamination, controls time and temperature when handling food, and proper cleaning and sanitizing.

Excel in CTE was launched in 2012 as a plan to enhance career technical education in Kansas and better prepare high school students for college and careers. Kansas high school students qualify for state-funded college tuition in approved technical courses offered by Kansas technical and community colleges. WRHS students have the opportunity to attend <u>Washburn Tech</u> as part of their regular school day, or they may elect to take online courses outside of school hours.

Resources

Naviance, <u>Pathful</u>, and YouScience are resources available to all students and can help students explore career options, employment trends in those industries, and the training or education needed.

SBE (School Based Enterprise) Certifications

Each year student-employees certify The Shack, Bank, and Common Grounds on three standards. This year the standards are Financial Analysis, Product/Service Management, and Pricing. Once the recertifications are submitted, judges will determine the tier of the certification: Gold, Silver, or Bronze. Gold certified and gold re-certified SBEs are eligible to bring up to two student manager(s) to the 2024 SBE Academy at the International Career Development Conference (ICDC) in Anaheim, California. During the SBE Academy, students experience professional development sessions, network with other SBE managers and compete in front of judges with a prepared oral presentation based on one of the standards.

Stock Market Game

Participants in the SIFMA Foundation Stock Market Game develop and manage an online investment portfolio of stocks, mutual funds, bonds, ESG investments and cash. The Stock Market Game is available via web browser on any device or on The Stock Market Game mobile app available on Android or Apple. SMG allows DECA members to test their investment knowledge and skills against other DECA members in an online competition. The goal of the competition is to provide participants with the skills needed to be successful in their future financial lives by managing a diversified investment portfolio.

The DECA Stock Market Game will contain one ICDC qualifying event to take place from Monday, September 11, 2023, through Friday, December 8, 2023.

- Photos must be vertical (or they will be cropped to fit a vertical space).






